How and when will I get my test results?

Typically, within 48 hours a written report of your test will be sent to your referring doctor, who will review them with you. Additional time (*3 to 5 days*) may be required if we are comparing these test results to previous findings from other facilities.

My test is:

_ Carotid Duplex

Testing time is about 1 hour.

Lower Extremity Venous or Arterial Testing time is about 1 hour.

Upper Extremity Arterial or Venous Testing time is about 1 hour.

Renal Artery or Vein Testing time is about 1-1 ½ hours.

Abdominal Artery or Vein

Testing time is about 1 hour.

Preparation:

Abdominal Exams:

Do not eat or drink after midnight. Diabetics may take medicine with a small amount of water.

Renal Exams:


Drink plenty of fluids the day prior to your evening meal. Do not eat or drink after midnight. Diabetics may take medicine with a small amount of water.

Vascular Blood Flow Tests

(Duplex Ultrasound Exam and Physiologic Arterial Testing)

Duplex Ultrasound Exam

What is the test?

A duplex ultrasound scan is a noninvasive examination that uses color Doppler technology. Harmless high frequency sound waves bounce off the body's internal structures and are processed electronically to yield information about blood flow and the condition of the arteries and veins. A duplex ultrasound is painless, there is no radiation involved, and there are no risks known to be associated with its use. This test is typically used to diagnose suspected arterial or venous disease, as well, as other vascular problems.

How do I prepare?

Plan to arrive at your designated Imaging Services site 15 minutes before your scheduled appointment. There is no specific preparation for a duplex ultrasound scan of blood vessels in the arms, legs, and neck. It is best to wear loose-fitting clothing. If you are having a study of the blood vessels in your arms, we recommend wearing a tank top that exposes your shoulders, neck, and arms.

An ultrasound of the <u>abdominal</u> arteries and veins requires that you have nothing to eat or drink after midnight before your ultrasound. You may take regular medicine with a small amount of water.

What can I expect during the procedure?

You may be asked to change into a gown, depending on the specific exam. You will be asked to lie on an examining table for 30 to 60 minutes. The vascular technologist will apply some warm, clear gel to your skin. During the exam, an ultrasound transducer *(which looks like a wand)* will be moved lightly up and down your skin where the gel has been applied. Images created from the sound waves will appear on a video monitor. The sounds and images of blood moving through the vessels will later be analyzed by a radiologist.

How and when will I get my test results?

Typically, within 48 hours a written report of your test results will be sent to your referring doctor, who will review them with you. Additional time (3 to 5 days) may be required if we are comparing these test results to previous findings from other facilities.

Physiologic Arterial Testing

What is the test?

Physiologic arterial testing is another non-invasive way used to evaluate blood flow in the body's limbs. It is an accurate and painless test for Peripheral Arterial Disease (*PAD*).

How do I prepare?

There is no specific preparation for physiologic arterial testing. Arrive at the medical center about 15 minutes before your scheduled test to give yourself time for outpatient registration. Please wear loose-fitting clothing.

What can I expect during the test?

This exam is done by using blood pressure cuffs and a Doppler ultrasound probe. The blood pressure on your arms, legs and sometimes toes will be measured. The data from your arterial testing will later be analyzed by a radiologist. There are no after-effects from physiologic arterial testing.
